

 Titahi Bay (Shelly Bay), 90ft N—beware of being sucked into the gulley on the east side if the wind is at all westerly, Hang 1.


3. Baring Head,
Wainuiomata River
Mouth, committee
members have keys,
250ft glide down—bit
small for soaring for the
intermediate. Good for
doing just top landings.
Rated Hang 2, up to 15k
Hang 3 over 15k.

W. or NW. Private property, club has access rights. Good for gliding down and just soaring flights. Should not be attempted in strong winds north of Kapiti. Rated Hang 2 with 20 minutes air time, and with the approval of 2 Hang 4 pilots on site in winds up to 15k—otherwise Hang 3

4. Paekakariki Hill, 900ft,

5. Pukerua Bay, 700ft, private property pedestrian access from Raroa Place—car access

from Kape Kape Road. Committee members have keys. Northerly winds. Good soaring site but should not be attempted until all other sites have been flown and mastered. Bottom landings can be extremely hazardous for the inexperienced flyer. and the tally of injuries on this site speaks for itself. Any pilot attempting this site for the first time must seek advice and briefing from one of the experienced pilots before flying. Rated Hang 4.



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
